Millom & Broughton Agricultural Society

RULES & REGULATIONS OF THIS SOCIETY.

1. That this Society be called or styled the Millom & Broughton, Agricultural Society Ltd.(the Society). That it be considered established for the purpose of improving the breed of stock by the distributions of premiums, and should fund permits, of encouraging through the same means improvement in tillage of grasslands, the invention of improved implements of husbandry, and generally to improve agricultural practice and for the public benefit to advance education in the science of agriculture.

Purpose

2. To promote agriculture for the public benefit and to such end generally to improve it in all its branches and encourage skill and industry in all its trades, crafts and professions connected with it.
3. To hold in pursuance of its main object an annual agricultural show provided the Society shall not be obliged to hold a show in any year in relation to which the Committee of the society shall resolve that the holding of such show is impractical or nor in the interests of the society.
4. To apply the income for charitable purposes or such charitable organisations or institutions to be determined by the committee.

Governance

5. That the Society shall consist of an Honorary President, Honorary Vice President, Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer and Members.
6. That the Chair, Vice-Chair, Treasurer and Secretary shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting of the Society, which shall be quorate provided at least ten members of the Society are present.
7. That the Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary and Treasurer shall constitute the Show Management Committee and shall co-opt a Show Field Director, a Safety Officer, a Bio-Security officer, secretaries and chairs for the various Annual Show sections and any other roles necessary to organize and deliver the Society's annual agricultural show.
8. The Directors of the Society are the persons holding the offices of Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary and Treasurer, and these Directors are also the Trustees of the Society.
9. That any person wishing to become a member of the Society shall apply in writing (or by email) to the Secretary. Such membership applications shall be considered and recommended by the Directors of the Society and ratified at the Annual General Meeting of the Society.
10. The Directors of the Society reserve the right to decline to recommend a person for membership of the Society, with no obligation to provide an explanation. The Directors also reserve the right to recommend that someone cease to be a member of the Society, and this to be ratified at the Annual General Meeting.
11. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held in the spring of each year, and shall include the ratification of new members and the appointment of the Directors of the Society. It shall be quorate provided at least ten members of the Society are present.
12. The charity in general meeting shall have power to alter, add or to repeal the rules and the trustees shall adopt such means as they think sufficient to bring to the notice of members of the charity all such rules which shall be binding on all members of the charity. Provided that no rule shall be inconsistent with or shall affect or repeal anything contained in the memorandum or articles.

The Annual Agricultural Show

13. That the annual Agricultural Show of the Society shall be held at West Park, Broughton in Furness on the last Saturday in August, for the Exhibition of stock, awarding premiums, and transacting any business connected with the affairs of the Society.
14. That the Show Management Committee shall have power to offer such premiums as they think best calculated to benefit the interest of agriculture generally, and particularly as regards to rearing of stock.

15. That the Show Management Committee appoint a competent and impartial person to determine upon the merits of the different animals etc, brought into competition, and who are to give their judgement accordingly.
16. That the Committee reserve to itself the power of withholding merit, and of giving premiums in every case where there appears great merit, although there may be only one candidate.
17. That all matches and sweepstakes entered into the meetings of the Society be inserted in the minutes, and be decided in the same manner as the prizes offered by the society.
18. The Show, its Officers, or volunteers shall not be responsible for any accident, damage or loss however caused, that may occur to any exhibitor, or volunteers or to any article, animal or property brought on to the show ground or while entering or leaving the show ground. Each exhibitor shall be solely responsible for any loss, injury to damage that may be done, or occasioned by, or arising from any machinery or article, or any animal or property exhibited by him, and it is a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall indemnify and hold harmless the show form and against, suits, expenses and claims on account of such damage or injury.
19. All prize money to be paid out at the discretion of the treasurer.

Privacy Policy

20. At the Millom & Broughton Agricultural Society we are committed to protecting and respecting privacy.
21. The policy sets out the basis on which any personal data we collect from you, that you provide to us or that we may receive from others about you will be processed by us. It includes data that we hold electronically and in paper files.
22. When joining the Millom & Broughton Agricultural Society, booking a trade stand or entering to compete at the Millom & Broughton Show (or other Society organised events) or other similar activities with which the Society is involved, we may need to share your data with relevant regulatory and similar bodies. For instance, if there is a breed society requirement for a class your details may need to be verified by them.
23. We are required to provide you with this information under the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), which comes into force on 25 May 2018.
24. We will process data to deliver the services the Millom & Broughton Agricultural Society provides to you.
25. The retention of data will be held as necessary where we have a legal obligation or other legitimate reason for doing so.
26. You have the right to know what information we hold about you. Unless the issue is complex, we will respond within one month.
27. You have the right to have any information we hold about you corrected if it is inaccurate or incomplete. Unless the issue is complex, we will respond within one month.
28. You have the right to request the deletion or removal of personal data where there is no compelling reason for us to continue to hold it.
29. You have the right to restrict our processing of your data in certain circumstances, such as when there is a question over the way in which we are using it.
30. You have the right to obtain and reuse your personal data for your own purposes.
31. You have the right to object to our processing of your personal data on the basis of legitimate interest and for direct marketing.
32. We will stop processing your data on the basis of legitimate interest unless there are compelling legitimate grounds for us to continue.
33. We will stop any processing of your data for direct marketing as soon as we receive an objection.
34. Our site may contain links to and from other websites. If you follow a link to any of these websites, please note that they have their own privacy policies and we do not accept any liability for these policies.

Millom & Broughton Agricultural Society TOP TRAY COMPETITION RULES

1. The Millom & Broughton Show Top Tray Class is for a collection of three types of Vegetables from the following list of eight. The quantity of each vegetable required for the collection is given in brackets: carrots (3); runner beans (6 pods); cauliflowers (2); onions (3); parsnips (3); peas (6 pods); potatoes (3); tomatoes (6). Each type of vegetable will be judged out of 20 points. This is split into three sections as follows: seven points for size, shape and colour; seven points for condition; six points for uniformity. The overall mark will therefore will be out of 60.
2. All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. The vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring 457 x 610mm / 18" x 24" without bending any of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray. A tray board measuring 457 x 610mm / 18" x 24" can be used to display the vegetables, or the area can simply be marked on the staging. Where a tray has a lid or edge, it is the internal measurement that must not exceed 457 x 610mm / 18" x 24"
3. A black cloth is permitted and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing but no other foliage or accessories such as plates, sand rings and so on will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied with raffia or string.
4. The winner of the Millom & Broughton Top Tray will receive £5, second place £3 and third place £2.

NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- Carrots and Parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 75mm / 3"
- Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached
- Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case)
- Judges may handle exhibits, open pods and so on to check for quality
- Judges shall use their discretion when judging the Top Tray Class, bearing in mind that the entries may not come from regular exhibitors
- The points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitor's cards
- Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to and decided by the Show Officials
- Failure to abide by any of these rules will lead to disqualification

TOP VASE COMPETITION RULES

1. The Millom & Broughton Show Top Vase Class is a vase of mixed flowers containing a total of 5 and 10 stems, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plants. PLEASE note that this is two different KINDS of plants; two different varieties of the same flower are NOT two kinds.
2. The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points, split into: 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display; 10 marks for the overall presentation and effect of the plants in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions. Judging of the flowers should be normal Royal Horticultural Society rules.
3. Plants used in the display must be showing flowers only; no seeds or heads of berries allowed.
4. The vase can be any shape or size made from any material but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase itself.
5. No accessories – such as bows and additional foliage – will be allowed. Foliage which is growing naturally from the flowering stem and is still attached to that stem, is allowed. Packing material, including florists' foam to keep the stems upright and in place, is allowed.
6. The winner of the Millom & Broughton Top Vase will receive £5, second place £3 and third place £2.

NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- A vase, by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point.
- The Top Vase class is open for anyone to enter and is not purely for growers who regularly display single species classes at shows.
- Judges should use their discretion when judging the Top Vase Class, bearing in mind that the entries may not come from regular exhibitors.
- Judges should note that the display has to be viewed from all around.
- The points should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitors' cards.
- Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the Show Officials.
- Failure to abide by these rules will lead to disqualification.
